Meet The 1998 Board of Directors

There are many new faces on the Preservation of Williamsport Foundation's board. We hope that you will have an opportunity to meet them all, if you aren't acquainted with them already. Until then, here is a little information about the people who are currently overseeing the mission of Preservation Williamsport.

Charles Luppert is our new President. As you probably know, serving as president is not a role Chuck is unfamiliar with. He joined Williamsport National Bank in 1971 and has been President since 1989. Chuck and his wife Hallie, an excellent golfer, have always been very active in this community.

Historic Sign Project

On May 16th Preservation Williamsport kicked off its Historic Sign Project with a ceremony and reception at Williamsport's City Hall, the recipient of the first historic structure plaque. The plaque will be hung on the outside of City Hall when current renovations are completed.

The Historic Sign Project was made possible by a generous grant from Williamsport National Bank. The plaque itself is a burnished bronze oval with a dark brown background measuring nine-by-seven

inches. Raised bronze lettering at the center top says

"Preservation Williamsport." The raised center of the plaque features our logo. a condensed sketch of the historic district, also in bronze on the brown

background. Bronze numerals at the center bottom of the plaque will feature the "circa" date of the structure being registered.

The plaques will be sold to qualified local historic property owners for \$90 each. Applications can be requested in writing from Judy Olinsky, at 150 Selkirk Road, Williamsport, PA 17701 or by calling her at 323-9898.

All properties must be 50 years or older and retain most of their architectural integrity. U.S. Department of Interior Standards for Historic Rehabilitation will be used to determine which properties will be eligible to receive plaques.

Preservation Williamsport hopes to use the information from the applications to create a catalogue of historic structures in the city that will be available for research and educational purposes.

Preservation Williamsport extends a beartfelt "Tbank You" to all the wonderful Period Home Owners and Volunteers wbo belped make 1997's Promenade such a success. We are very grateful for your continued support and enthusiasm.


ANNUAL EXCELLENCE AWARD
